Connect Have you had any past experiences with the book of Revelation, either positive or negative?

Read Revelation 2:8-11 and 3:14-22. (In the language of Revelation's original audiences, "Jews" in 2:9 wouldn't mean only ethnic Jews but all the people of God's Messiah Jesus.)

- What do these brief letter-like introductions tell us about the life of each of these early Christian communities? What can we say about them? (If you have a good study Bible, you may find some additional background notes or even maps that you could share with your group.)
- What key messages are being communicated to Christians in Smyrna (and those in similar situations)? Do these messages speak to you somehow?
- What key messages are being communicated to Christians in Laodicea (and those in similar situations)? Do these messages speak to you somehow?

Read Revelation 4-5. Many people read Revelation to decode a sequence of events that will come in the future, but these chapters are the heart of Revelation's vision of "what must take place after this (4:1)." Christians who understand the message of these chapters will grasp the center of Revelation's message.

- As a group, try to summarize what happens in this vision.
- Revelation says that Jesus is authorized to represent God faithfully (Only he is worthy to open the scroll), and that he is *both* a Lion and a Lamb. What do these images say to you?
- In what ways is this passage encouraging to you? In what ways is it a warning to you?

Apply

Read Revelation 22:1-5. In the story of the Bible, the world has suffered much since the fall from Eden at the beginning of Genesis. Revelation says that God has not abandoned His creation. Quite the opposite, the entire story culminates in God restoring and renewing His creation. All who have returned to God in Jesus the Savior gather around the Tree of Life again.

• Is God calling you to renewed faithfulness to Him somehow? What next steps do you feel you might need to take?

Those who are suffering need strength. Those who are compromised need clarity and repentance. Pray for your own group and for Christians everywhere that we will hear God's word and turn our hearts to Him.
