There's a reason the early church chose to celebrate Jesus' birthday at this time of year. The days are short, the nights are long: a time of increasing darkness--but then, around the end of December comes a change!

The church chose to celebrate December 24 & 25 as the Eve and Day of Jesus' birth to remind the world that Jesus is the light of the world. Because our God chose to find us where we were, in the darkness.

Now, with the light of his redeeming love, every moment we spend with him, even in this dark world, we grow in our true identity as children of the light.

In his love for us, our God sent Jesus to be *God With Us*: born in poverty in a lowly stable, to become the Savior of all humanity. The Joy of Christmas is to know and receive the truth, that no matter where you are in your own darkness today, Jesus' gift, here and now, is that God is with you. OPENING SCRIPTURE

John 1:1-5, 9-12, 14 (NIV) The Plan



READING

Luke 2:8-20 The Announcement

And there were shepherds living out in the fields nearby, keeping watch over their flocks at night. An angel of the Lord appeared to them, and the glory of the Lord shone around them, and they were terrified. But the angel said to them, "Do not be afraid. I bring you good news that will cause great joy for all the people. Today in the town of David a Savior has been born to you; he is the Messiah, the Lord. This will be a sign to you: You will find a baby wrapped in cloths and lying in a manger." Suddenly a great company of the heavenly host appeared with the angel, praising God and saying, "Glory to God in the highest heaven, and on earth peace to those on whom his favor rests." When the angels had left them and gone into heaven, the shepherds

said to one another, "Let's go to Bethlehem and see this thing that has happened, which the Lord has told us about." So they hurried off and found Mary and Joseph, and the baby, who was lying in the manger. But Mary treasured up all these things and pondered them in her heart. The shepherds returned, glorifying and praising God for all the things they had heard and seen, which were just as they had been told.

"In the beginning was the Word..." We live in a world of words and images. If I say the word love, you might have an image in your mind of a romantic evening with your spouse. If I say the word peace, you might have an image of a quiet evening in a lakeside cabin. Hope might bring to mind the anticipation of a new job opportunity. And joy might fill your thoughts with images of your child's graduation from college.

"In the beginning was the Word..." The year 2020 introduced us to several words that were much more negative. Words like isolation, quarantine, pandemic, protest, and social distancing. We have heard them a lot. We have seen the images on our screens, in our neighborhoods, and in our minds that fill us with dread. The words become weapons. The words start to hurt. The hurt leads to anger. The anger leads to division. And we isolate further from each other.

"The Word became flesh..." There is a deep longing to be in the presence of one another. To see each other "in the flesh." To embrace. Zoom and Skype just don't cut it. We are cut-off. You can't hug a screen. Facetime is no substitute for fleshtime. We feel lonely. We feel alone.

"The Word became flesh and dwelt among us." Into a lonely world, God spoke! Just as it was in the beginning. God spoke and the world came into being. Now, God spoke, and his Word became flesh and blood. God spoke and a child was born. God spoke and his Son was given. God spoke and Jesus moved into the neighborhood.

We are not alone. *God is With Us*! God broke quarantine to send Jesus to a sick world. God closed the distance and Jesus knocked on our door. He has come to sit at your table. He has come to hold your hand. He has come to forgive your angry words and heal your broken heart. God is with you. He has come to save you. To save me. To save us all.

Now it's your turn to speak. It's your turn to say, "Jesus is with me. I am not alone. Jesus loves me. I am not afraid. Jesus has saved me. I am a child of God."

So during this strangest-of-all Christmases, may you know the love, hope, peace, and joy, that can be found in a manger in Bethlehem. Jesus is with you! Come and adore him, born the King of Angels!

IN PREPARATION

The Story of Silent Night

Every year, we have ended our Traditional Christmas Eve service with the lighting of candles and the singing of the Hymn, "Silent Night." This year, this is more fitting than ever! This much beloved Christmas Carol was actually first written in response to a crisis, when 'normal' plans had fallen apart.

In 1818, as a church in the Austrian Alps was preparing for their Traditional Christmas eve service, Father Joseph Mohr discovered the church organ was broken, ruining all the plans he'd put in place for the worship music that night. But in that moment of crisis, it occurred to him that in the silencing of all his expectations, this might be the moment for a new song to be written to reflect the simplicity of the wonder of God choosing to enter our world. Together with his organist, Franz Gruber, he composed this simple, beautiful hymn. First accompanied by guitar for midnight worship Christmas Eve, proving to us still today that even when everything in this world seems broken, our expectations shattered, God still surprises us. He surprises us with the unexpected gifts of his grace, joy, and unshakable love.

This year, even though we are not able to gather together in the same way as we have in the past, *God is Still With Us*. We are not united this year by our gathering, but we are united as Jesus' people all around the world, by the promise of the same Lord: Emmanuel, *God With Us*. In witness of our faith by lighting a candle, we each remember the truth that unites us all around the world, *the light of our lives is found in Jesus*, and together his light in each of us lights the world into every dark corner, by his saving grace.



LIGHT YOUR CANDLES AND PRAY

Lord God, you know this year everything seems broken; plans and expectations in ruins. And yet, nothing of earth can destroy the song of the joy you gave us this day. Today, we celebrate the true Joy of Christmas, that you, Jesus, came to be *God With Us*. You made your home with us, so our home can be with you, now and forever. To us, a child is born, to us a son is given, and he shall be called wonderful counselor, everlasting father, Prince of Peace.

In the quiet of this night, Lord, help us to feel the wonder of this gift. You, Lord, have chosen to spend this night with us; to give us the gift of your presence, with us and for us, from this moment and in every moment yet to come, even into eternity. You are, and have come to always be, *God With Us*.

Thank you Lord, for being this gift to us, and to those all over the world this night, who claim you as the light of the world. May the honor and praise of your church, scattered though it may be, bring you honor and joy, Lord, as we light our candles against the darkness; trusting that you alone, are the light.
